

Knights of Columbus California State Council Food for Fam Seam Families Food Drive



The Knights of Columbus is continuing the tradition for raising awareness of the issues behind poverty and hunger. Since 2012 the inception year of the Food for Families Program, the Knights of Columbus had already donated \$8.5 Million and 14.7 million pounds of food to local food banks, local food pantries, community food banks and soup kitchen The month of November and December are the busy months for food drive because of the Thanks Giving and Christmas Season and also the month of November is the World Food Day.

Action Steps:

- Contact your local parish food pantry, community food bank or soup kitchen to ensure they will be able to receive food donations and inquire if they have any specific needs.
- Obtain permission from the appropriate person (pastor, business owner(s), etc.) to set up the food drive at the church or store and to display posters.

Ask nearby retail stores for empty boxes so there is a place to store donations.

If the council is conducting the Food Drive at the parish, have flyers available for distribution or placed in the pews announcing the details of the Food Drive.

- Ask the pastor for permission to make an announcement before or after Mass about the Food Drive.
- Be sure to include a written announcement in the parish bulletin.

For monetary donations, be sure to have a secure receptacle in the collection area for cash and checks. Please be sure that your Parish Pastor will announce during the mass that donation bins are placed outside the Church. Brother let's do our part to strive for a hunger-free community by filling those bins with food for families in need this year!

The food that are acceptable are all non-perishable food donations and in need of nutritious items:

- Meals in a can (soup, stew, chili)
- Tuna or canned chicken
- Peanut butter
- Canned foods with pop-top lids
- Canned fruit in its own juice or water
- Low-sodium canned vegetables
- Olive or canola oil
- Spices
- Low-sugar whole grain cereals
- Healthy snacks (granola bars, nuts, dried fruit)

*Please avoid items packed in glass. No candy or soda please.

You can also submit the form to the State via regular U.S. mail. The deadlines for submission is the 15th of each month (i.e. for November, it must be submitted by Dec. 15th).

This Columbian Year (2017-2018), I would really like to see a Family of the Year submitted for the International Family of the Year. We haven't submitted a Family to Supreme for the International Family of the Year in several years, and I believe California has many eligible families that could be nominated for the International Family of the Year. So let's get those Family of the Month names submitted to the State, and also the Family of the Year to the Supreme (never too early to start thinking about it now!!!). Wouldn't it be great to honor a California family as the International Family of the Year!!!!!

Also, don't forget we have other programs in Family Activities. Food for Families, Coats for Kids, Scholarships, and World Day of Marriage. By getting involved in these programs, they all count towards the Building the Domestic Church requirements.

Grand Knights, please don't forget to complete the Service Program Activities Monthly Reporting Form for Family Activities <u>each month</u> (it can be found on the State Council website under the forms section). It is very important that we receive these reports from all the councils every month so we track each council.

"Be Not Afraid" - A Knights Wellness Story

Hello, my Brother Knights!

This is a true story about cancer - the struggles of the initial diagnosis; the treatments; the early hopes when it was first diagnosed; and the unfolding future.

At the time of his diagnosis, this friend and Brother Knight was 51 years old, married, with four children, and a beautiful wife. His life as a physician at this time was at its apogee. After 25 years in medical "practice" he was hitting on all eight cylinders. He insists that he was "doing medicine" at this point in his career. "What doctor at this point in his career is just "practicing?"

He spoke with his primary MD about a pain he was having in his lower abdomen, requesting a CT of the abdomen. This was done in early November, 2004. He did not have any symptoms, appetite was good, weight stable. My friend was a vigorous athlete, playing racketball, hitting the weight machines, and bicycling frequently.

Then he learns there is a tumor in his pancreas, about 4 centimeters in diameter and, cancerous. Damn! It's a fairly rare cancer, called "pancreatic neuroendocrine tumor", PNET.

My friend is incredulous, wondering how such a misfortune could have befallen him. He travels to his church; he's a Catholic. He goes into the Blessed Sacrament Chapel and on his hands and knees, begs God to grant him more time, to help him fight this tough battle ahead. Although very frightened, he does believe God has a plan, that he must make the most of his predicament. He doesn't know it yet, but he will come to realize that this painful moment will be a positive turning point in his life.

Next issue - continuing tests and surgery await my friend and Brother Knight.

Do Not Be Afraid, part 2

Nov., 2017

Hello, my Brother Knights!

As you might recall, my friend, Tom, had just been diagnosed with a PNET, a pancreatic neuroendocrine tumor, in early November, 2004. He would come to find that this is a fairly rare tumor and that it can be managed, depending on its location and how aggressive it is.

Once the tumor was found on the CT scan, a barrage of tests and procedures awaited him.

He was seen by an oncologist who mapped-out the plan for attacking this cancer, henceforth called the "critter".

Lab tests were ordered to give the oncologist a baseline for reference as the treatment proceeded. A radiology test, called **octreotide scan**, was done, localizing the critter to the pancreas, some "good news", as this meant that he could possibly retain a remnant of his pancreas, a very important organ in the body.

The pancreas controls two very important chemical functions- the **exocrine** function helps our bodies to digest the food we eat, the proteins, fats and carbohydrates; the **endocrine** function helps us with sugar utilization in our bodies.

An MRI and a PET scan were done, confirming the location of the tumor and suggesting that it was malignant. In order to confirm the diagnosis, a piece of the tumor tissue had to be obtained.

So, Tom had a procedure, called an EGD-esophageal gastro-duodenoscopy. This entailed the passage of a fiberscopic camera down the esophagus, into the stomach. The tumor was localized via an ultrasound, and a biopsy needle was passed through the stomach wall into the cancer. (Do not attempt to do this at home!)

The pathology report returned positive for malignant PNET, a slowly aggressive tumor.

Tom received this news with renewed hope as the cancer might be treated with surgical removal along with some new medicines coming down the pipeline for treating this type of cancer.

An interesting note here was that Steve Jobs, of Apple fame, was also diagnosed at this time with a similar cancer. Unfortunately, he dawdled in his response to this cancer, waiting more then 9-12 months before having surgery done, and it was done too late.

So, Tom now had a confirmed diagnosis of cancer, and was told that a surgical procedure would be very beneficial for him to enhance his survival.

Next issue- telling the Family about the critter.

Life-Saving Ultrasound Machines are needed more than ever with Brother Knights' help

Ultrasound Machines are so vital in saving unborn lives. Well over 80% of distressed expecting parents will choose life after they view ultrasound images of their pre-born child. But there is new urgent reason ultrasound machines are needed in the fight to save lives of the unborn.

Recent statistics show that nearly 46% of first-trimester abortions are attempted using the "abortion pill." Under new California state laws, a girl as young as 12 can obtain the abortion pill, also known as a medication abortion, and then possibly ending in a surgical abortion all without parental consent. If she takes an abortion pill, she will most likely attempt this at home alone. A panicking pregnant college girl might do the same in her dorm room. Likewise, for a single mom who cannot imagine how she can possibly feed one more mouth.

For the past year Obria Medical Clinics have partnered with San Diego-based **AbortionPillReversal.com (APR) hotline**. Alycia De Lucio RN, who is Obria's Nurse Administrator/Telemedicine Manager, deals with crises like these and shares one such experience:

"I received a call about a young woman who wanted to reverse the abortion pill process. After speaking with her I found out that she had made that decision because she had just had a baby 6 weeks prior and felt overwhelmed about having another baby so soon after. We got her started on the APR protocol of progesterone and stayed in touch with her until she could come in for her first prenatal appointment. She had started having some bleeding so we were all praying and hoping that her baby would make it. I got to meet with her in person at her initial prenatal appointment with Dr Anzaldo and be in the room for her first ultrasound. It brought me to tears because on the screen, at 12 weeks' gestation, the baby was moving around. It was just so beautiful to see a literal miracle with my own eyes; a baby truly saved from death! We continued to do all her prenatal care with many more beautiful ultrasounds that followed. Dr. Anzaldo delivered her healthy baby 7 months later that followed."

One of the tools critical to the APR procedure is ultrasound, which allows nurses to see if the pregnancy is viable. An added blessing is the relief experienced by a young woman or girl who has taken the abortion pill and sees the same viability. She now comes full circle from shame, despair and regret to feelings of hope, joy and love for the new life growing inside her.

Without ultrasound, we could not save nearly so many unborn, nor change the lives of their mothers and fathers. Without the Knights of Columbus, we simply could not fully accomplish our God-given mission.

So how are California Knights doing this Columbian year? Thus far this Columbian year six ultrasound applications have been sent to Supreme, with four corresponding checks received resulting in ultrasound machines helping save baby lives. 63 ultrasound machines have been placed in California since 2009 through this K of C Supreme program. Yet more can still be done with the California Ultrasound Program Team here ready to help:

Down Syndrome and its link to Alzheimer's

Frank Stephens, an actor, advocate, and adult living with Down Syndrome, spoke at a Congressional hearing Wednesday, October 25, 2017, urging Congress to fund vital research on Down syndrome and its link to Alzheimer's in the NIH budget.

"Let me say that I am not a research scientist, however, no one here knows more about life with Down syndrome than I do. Whatever you learn today please remember this: I am a man with Down syndrome and my life is worth living. Across the world, a notion is being sold that maybe we don't need research concerning Down syndrome. Some people say pre-natal screenings will identify Down syndrome in the womb, and those pregnancies will just be terminated. It is hard for me to sit here and say those words. Let's be clear, I completely understand that the people pushing that particular 'final solution' are saying that people like me should not exist. They are saying that we have too little value to exist, an outdated idea of life with Down syndrome. Seriously, I have a great life. I have lectured at universities, I have acted in an award-winning film and on an Emmy winning TV show, and spoken to thousands of young people about the value of inclusion in making America great. We are a medical gift to society, a blueprint for medical research into cancer, Alzheimer's, and Immune System disorders. We do a very good job communicating internally, however, there are many times we need to communicate externally through a viable Public Relations program. Below are Public Relations Guidelines developed by our Public Relations Chairman, Brother Isaac Cuevas. Public Relations Guidelines

As a Knight of Columbus, you should continually search for new ways to enhance our Order's mission and contributions to the Church, community, and fellowman.

The Knights of Columbus Member Social Communications Policy and Guidelines apply to members and subordinate units of the Knights of Columbus when they choose to identify themselves as members of the Knights of Columbus or to discuss the work of the Knights of Columbus in social communications. **READ the Knights of Columbus Member Social Communications Policy.**

Public relations can be a very useful communications tool, advancing Knights of Columbus principles and building community support for your council and its activities. Public relations is simply communicating a message to an audience. To build a truly effective public relations program, messages should be ongoing to strengthen the council's image and broaden its impact on society.


A critical part of public relations is publicity. Successful publicity efforts result in editorial media exposure in the form of news or feature articles in newspapers, magazines and websites, and references, announcements or interviews on radio and television stations. Publicity is a very effective way to inform the public about the many aspects of the Knights of Columbus and how you work with/for your parish and within your community. Send in photo and article about your council's activities to the Knightletter editor. It is also important to contact the Communications Director of your local Diocese in case you have a parish based news event that will require their input or approval.

There are many rewards and benefits to a well-planned public relations program. For the Knights of Columbus, an effective program can:

- 1. Create awareness in the community for your council and its contributions.
- 2. Build a positive image for the Knights of Columbus as a whole, and council in particular.
- 3. Create valuable exposure for the council and its activities.
- 4. Communicate key messages to target audiences.
- 5. Clear away misconceptions.
- 6. Strengthen community support for the Knights of Columbus and its mission.
- 7. Assist in recruiting new members.

Mexican Martyrs Prayer Service

The Knights of Columbus for over 135 years have been promoting vocations to the priesthood. This prayer service is intended to continue that long tradition by reflecting on the gift of priests to the church. Specifically, we also honor those six Mexican Priest Martyrs who gave their lives for their people who were all Knights of Columbus Brothers. Mexican Martyrs Service Award for Chaplains

The six Mexican priests were martyred for their faith during a time of turmoil in Mexico when Catholics were being persecuted. All of them died because they chose to continue to serve their people despite the threat of death. We want to honor their sacrifice by creating an award in their name that will be given out during the year to the chaplains in California who give of themselves not only to their parish and diocese but also to the Knights as a chaplain.

The Knights of Columbus are forever thankful for the dedicated priests who not only serve their parish or community but who also take the time to serve the Knights of Columbus as chaplains. The Knights want to honor and thank those dedicated priests for their service throughout the Columbian Year. Each month beginning in September 2017 through February 2018 we will honor the Knights of Columbus Chaplains who have displayed extraordinary service to their Council and Parish. These priests will automatically be considered for the yearly Fr. Juan Perez Award given out at the California State Convention. Details can be found in the 2017-18 Operations Handbook.

December: Saint Miguel de la Mora Mexican Martyr Award



Father Pedro de Jesus Maldonado Lucero was a member of Council 2419. Forced to study for the priesthood in El Paso, Texas, because of the political situation in Mexico, he returned home after his ordination in 1918 despite the risk. Captured on Ash Wednesday, 1937, while distributing ashes to the faithful, Father Maldonado Lucero was so savagely beaten that one eye was forced from its socket. He died the next day at a local hospital. His tombstone aptly described this martyr in four words: "You are a priest."






